Attorney General Barr,

We extend our sincere gratitude to you for your April 27, 2020 memorandum to the Department of Justice. That communication serves as a welcome and timely reminder that elected officials should be monitored to ensure they continue to respect the American system of government and the constitutional protections afforded every citizen even in times of crisis.

We write today to bring your attention to certain policies implemented by Connecticut's Governor, Ned Lamont, by executive order in response to public health concerns related to COVID-19. We fully recognize the many unknowns that existed just over a month ago and the need for reasonable executive action in the face of a potentially devastating public health emergency. However, we are deeply concerned that Governor Lamont has exceeded his executive authority in violation of both the Connecticut and United States Constitutions, and continues to implement similar policies without authority or justifiable cause.

For your reference, below is an abridged list of specific concerns followed by a supplemental addendum page with citations.

As of today, Governor Lamont has:

- Drawn an arbitrary distinction between "essential" and "non-essential" businesses, forcing thousands of Connecticut companies to close or severely limit their ability to engage in commerce, and causing immeasurable damage to our states economic viability. This order, infringes on a citizen's right to equal protection and private property in conflict with the 5th and 14th amendments to our US Constitution.
- 2. Denied Connecticut citizens their right to assemble by forbidding gatherings of five or more persons, raising 1st amendment concerns respecting assembly and religion.
- Interfered with the ability of citizen's right to private contracts in conflict with Article I, Section 10, Clause 1 of the U.S. Constitution by the creation of a "rental assistance program" that altered private rental agreements between adult citizens.
- 4. Established a 50 person board of unelected persons from CT and surrounding states, "Reopen CT," to make public policy in response to the COVID-19 pandemic absent any legislative involvement or input.
- 5. Infringed on a citizen's ability to purchase a firearm or ammunition by diminishing access to retailers and background check procedures, in conflict with the 2nd amendment.

We appreciate your time and attention to our concerns and stand ready to support you and your staff if you need any further information from Connecticut.
