Maria C. Colon Sanchez

Maria C. Colon Sanchez (1926 - November 15, 1989) was a Puerto Rican American educator and a civil rights advocate for Latinos in Connecticut. She was also an activist and politician. She was also known as the "La madrina" (the godmother). In 1988, Maria became the first Hispanic woman elected to the Connecticut General Assembly. The Connecticut General Assembly is a place in Hartford, Connecticut in the House of Representatives who work with public welfare, civil, the environment, criminal law, education, and more.

How did she contribute to the state and nation? Maria contributed to Connecticut in many ways. On August 10th, 1969 the French Canadians and Puerto Ricans in Harford turned into a riot known as the "Comanchero Riot," where about 150 men gathered at the intersection of Park and Main Street. Maria tried to calm down the police, firefighters and the general public. She then organized a meeting between the men and the city of Hartford. Also, in 1954 Maria and her husband convinced Puerto Ricans to vote in the election. One of her biggest accomplishments was fighting for rights for Latinos to go to English schools. These schools hired Spanish teachers, so the Spanish speaking Latinos could learn English. She was focused on bilingual education and served on the Hartford board of education. In 1972, she contributed to opening La Escuelita, which was the first bilingual school in Connecticut.

Based on the facts and information that is given about Maria Sanchez; would you look at Maria as one of your everyday idols? Maria was the liberator of a civil rights movement for the Puerto Rican community and focused on bilingual education. Thanks to Maria now all Latinos can attend any English school and bilingual schools. Maria also made the Puerto Rican parades possible. Fun fact, there is a Maria C.
